



FOG DESIGN+ART 2026 CLOSES WITH ROBUST SALES, ENTHUSIASTIC RECEPTION, AND HIGHEST TICKET SALES TO DATE

San Francisco, CA (Monday, January 26, 2026) – FOG Design+Art closed the 12th edition of the fair with record-breaking ticket sales and an enthusiastic reception from visitors and exhibitors alike. The fair brought together more than **60 leading art and design galleries** from around the world, a captivating series of standing-room-only **FOG Talks**, and the return of **FOG MRKT** in the Pier 3 entryway, showcasing works by local artisans.

This year, **Perrotin** presented a solo booth dedicated to the work of Korean-American artist Young-II Ahn (1934–2020). The gallery sold seven works by Youn-II Ahn, in the range of \$25,000 - \$170,000. During the five-plus decades the artist lived in LA, the landscape, light, and atmosphere of California played a prominent role in his artwork. A highlight of the FOG presentation is an early *Water* painting from the 1980s that exemplifies the artist's fascination with water's refractory qualities. Some other works that sold include *Cat*, *Self-Reflection T-5*, and *Harbor*. The gallery's FOG presentation anticipates the artist's survey exhibition at Perrotin New York in September 2026.
